
Heage on your night arms you reach the gate, then bear left diagonally across and down the field to the corner. Look down into Wiggaton hamlet, nestling in the valley on your right. Cross over 2 stiles at each side of a small gully, then bear diagonally right to-the gate at the bottom of the field.

Turn left into Wiggaton Road. Turn right, up the track between old cob farm building and stream.

Walk up to a gate, following the path directly to a stile leading into a wooded valley with a deep gully. This area is rich in flora and fauna so be aware that you are sharing the route with other living things.

During the spring the flowers are abundant here; however, later in the year bracken also becomes abundant. Keep well up the slope and head towards the right upper corner over a stile into field. Bear right up towards the hedge line, then go over a stile at a thick hedge. Look back towards Ottery and over to Barrow or Knapps Hill beneath the East Hill Strip and forward to Sidmouth Gap, with West Hill to the right.

Turn left: follow the hedge to the gate. Then turn left up a lane through the farm area - please respect farmer's property and shut the gate after you.



Pass Burrow Hill Farm (the name referring to Barrow Hill nearby) Pass Monks Hollow thatched cottage, a grade II listed building dating back to at least the 14th century and reputed to be a rest halt for those using the old pack horse route from Sidmouth. Follow the lane, turning left into Knightstone lane.





Turn left after farm buildings and an orchard. Enjoy Gosford Lane, a Devon lane, and its hedgebanks; walk to Taleford. Notice the views of East Hill Strips on the left and go past the school house on right.

Turn left into the footpath. (FP20). Go through the gate; keep the hedge close on your left and cross over the stile. Bear right to a substantial footbridge.

Cross into a tiela. Keep to the lett, following an old, disused leat/ditch to a stile into the lane. Here you will have a good view of Cadhay, a manor house of mixed Tudor and Georgian design. Turn left and follow lane through old railway crossing past signalman's cottage and the dismantled railway. Cross the two rivers using the Talewater Bridge and the Cadhay Bridge (built in 1806, restored 1987) over the river Otter. Follow lane through Dunkirk and back to the main car park.




This walk takes about 14 shours - and is 2 miles in length.

Leave Ottery St. Mary along Jesu Street and Yonder Street, following a sign to Seaton (Chineway) and follow for 1 3/4 miles. As you start on the steepest part of the hill and just after a minor road joins from the right and the wood begins on the left, turn right into a cléaring where there is room to park.

Cross the road (slightly downhill) to the beginning of a path (Footpath 18) that follows inside the edge of the wood northwards. There is a wooden seat a few yards from the entrance.


F ollow the path until it emerges into a field over a high stile (very tight skirts could be a disadvantage) and following the same contour cross the field to a stile on the left of a gate at the far end.



Cross to the front of 'Moorcroft' (marked on map as "East Hill Farm") to footpath 17. Keep to the left of the house and farm buildings, close to the hedge and across another stile. The path is divided from the farmyard by a wire fence. A further stile at the end of the yard leads back into woodland through an area of bracken. When the bracken is high the line of the path is not very clear, but it moves uphill somewhat away from the hedge on the left until it becomes clearer beyond the bracken.

The path follows the western fringe of the wood inside the hedge until it is crossed, more or less at tight right angles, by a sunken track signposted to the right as a bridleway (Bridleway 15). Follow this up the hill until it emerges on a tarred road and take this road to the right.

F ollow the lane until it bears away to the left. At this point there is a stone building on the right of the road and a track goes off to the right in front of it. This track divides, but follow the left hand fork to the point where a wide track, closed by a log, runs between low banks to the left. This is Muddy Lane (Bridleway 15B). It



At 1 Ottery Barton keep the Church of regory's on the left. After the road is d by a lane from the right follow on 1/4 to 1/2 a mile. Towards the top of ise there is a gap in the hedge on ight with a Footpath sign. Turn into parking area just inside. This is part of 1 Ottery Common.


n this site there are, on a clear day, wonderful panoramic views up the Valley through to Hembury Fort and pan Hill to the North-east with East idge running down to the Sidmouth


er taking in and enjoying the view, ff northwards along the track from parking area (Footpath 33). On ning the white gas pipe-line marker the track to the left, which leads n into the valley. Cross the road and take the track to the right of the cottages and bear right again up a rough track (Bridleway 72). Where the track joins another lane (Green Lane) turn right. After a short distance where another track comes up from the left stands the big stump of what was once a magnificent beech tree damaged by recent storms. Note the numerous initials etc. carved up the trunk, some sadly lost - was this 'lovers corner' between Metcombe and Venn Ottery?

Continue along Green Lane until it comes out on to the Venn Ottery Road and so up the hill to the Car Park on Venn Ottery Common and enjoy the view again, perhaps over a cup of tea and a picnic.
